Instructions:

Cut around the thick grey line on each card so that the letter name for the note is no longer attached. Write or glue the matching letter name onto the back of the card.

You may like to stick the flashcards onto heavier card and/or laminate them to stop them from wearing too quickly.

Tips:

- Start with learning Treble Clef - Middle C, D, E, F, G.
- Once confident with those move on to either:
 - Bass Clef C, D, E, F, G. or Treble clef A, B, C.
- Then add whichever you didn't learn above.
- Finally, add Bass clef A, B, C.

Ideas for use:

1. Parent holds out the cards for student to say
2. Student does them on their own, checking answers on back of cards.
3. Use a stopwatch to time how fast you can do it, then try to beat your own high score
4. Put the cards in any order, say them from left to right, then try playing them in that order
5. Instead of saying them, play them
6. Student tests parents and then races them!
